Presentation Format

Presentation sessions are 45 minutes long. Please plan to present for about 30 minutes and leave 15 minutes for Q&A or some other interactive activity.

Submission Instructions

Submit your proposal by completing the [DELTA Symposium Proposal Submission Form](#). The deadline for submission is March 15, 2022. Your submission should include:

- Title
- Abstract (up to 100 words)

- Description of presentation (up to 300 words). Breakout session descriptions should describe how the presenters will engage participants.
- Presenter names and bios
- Primary contact name
- Primary contact email
- Primary contact phone

Submission is limited to Johns Hopkins University faculty, staff, and students.

Selection Criteria

The program committee, which is composed of representatives from various schools and teaching and learning centers, will assess submissions on the following criteria:

- **Contribution:** the extent to which the submission provides timely and relevant insight into the enhancement of teaching and learning, especially fostering student engagement in learning communities.
- **Applicability:** the extent to which attendees will be able to apply your findings to their own work.
- **Alignment with symposium goals:** the extent to which the format of your presentation will provoke conversation, spark new thinking, advance the ongoing pursuit of teaching excellence, and foster student engagement.
